






Everyone deserves a future they can look forward to

Our play-based curriculum lets children learn while having fun. Our teaching staff is highly qualified and undergoes continual development and training.




FULL-DAY CARE & HOME-BASED PROGRAM

Revenue and expenses


The Centers provided essential services to many of Cleveland's most vulnerable children through our Head Start, Early Head Start, and Early Head Start-Child Care Partnerships programs.

During the 2020-2021 year, The Centers' was funded to serve 788 Head Start and 368 Early Head Start slots. However, due to the corona virus pandemic, number of children served was drastically reduced. The Centers' Head Start and Early Head Start, together with delegate agency, had a cumulative enrollment of 951 children from 863 families. The grantee's average monthly enrollment as a percentage of funded enrollment was 55.19% percent for both programs due to COVID-19 restrictions.

Children served by type of eligibility in the grantee's HS and EHS program in 2020-2021




The results of the most recent review by the Secretary and the financial audit.

Our last annual agency financial audit was completed in June 2021 for fiscal year January 1, 2020, to December 31, 2020 and the consolidated financial statements presented fairly in all material respects with no findings.

There was no federal monitoring event scheduled during the 2020-21 school year. Results of all previous monitoring events concluded that the grantee was in good standing.

Parent involvement activities

Family participation is encouraged throughout The Centers Head Start program with families and children alike benefitting from integrated efforts and our comprehensive approach. Some of the opportunities this past year included:



- School Readiness Activities included kindergarten school visits, school choice fairs, attendance awareness information.
- Introduction of LENA Program (EHS)-provided opportunities for parents and teachers to collaborate in order to increase talk and language development.

 from the Basic Needs Resource Center.
- Volunteer Opportunities planning events, at home activities to support the curriculum, art activities.
- Leadership and Advocacy Parent Committees, Policy Council, State Representative, National Representatives.
- Forums to solicit parent feedback, make meaningful contributions and advocate for their child. Parent Surveys, Self-Assessment, Parent Panels.
- Parent/Teacher Conferences, Mental Health and Wellness Presentations.
- Conferences and Trainings.
- Parent Meetings, Orientations, Welcome Back, Family Fun Days, Literacy/Read-a-louds.
- Parents were provided training opportunities to support their role as the child's first teacher and lifelong educator, primary advocate, leader, and continuous learner (Parenting Skills, Conscious Discipline, Child Development, Nutrition, Child Abuse, Mental Health, Safety, and Financial Literacy workshops)

Preparing children for kindergarten




The Grantee and its delegate agency assessed children's school readiness with three assessment tools, Child Observation Record (COR) Advantage, Teaching Strategies Gold (TSG) or Early Learning Assessment (ELA). The Centers for Families and Children used COR Advantage, Catholic Charities used TSG and Cleveland Metropolitan School District used ELA. Each assessment tool is aligned with the Ohio Early Learning and Development Standards and allow teachers to intentionally plan for children in their classrooms.

The Centers for Families and Children and Catholic Charities operated year-round programs and had four check points during 2020-2021 to collect, aggregate and analyze children's ongoing assessment data. The Cleveland Metropolitan School District (CMSD) operated over the course of nine months and had three check points. During the 2020-2021 school year, children's ongoing assessment data was collected in October, January, April and July. At the minimum, children's ongoing assessment data was aggregated and analyzed three times, during the year. Results of data analyses were shared with teachers and parents following each check point.


Each assessment tool had different rating scales that indicated performances of children. On the average, children showed progressive development from beginning to end of year. Grantee also provided opportunities for children in partial year programs to improve their readiness during summer months. Overall, children's average ongoing assessment ratings at end of school year showed progressive development among all age groups. Graphs from COR, ELA and tables from TSG below show average development of children by age group from beginning to end of year, by area or category assessed. In the Centers for Children and Families and Catholic Charities, children ages zero to five were served. In CMSD, only four-year old children were served, where ELA was used for assessment.


COR Advantage Graph (4- and 5-year-old children)




