Right now, our neighbors face severe mental health and addiction crises alone. Too often, their only options are overcrowded emergency rooms or jail cells. Neither setting provides the compassionate, trauma-informed stabilization they deserve.

The Glick Recovery Campus is Cuyahoga County's first 24/7 behavioral health crisis center, established by The Centers in Cleveland's Central neighborhood.

Located at the former St. Vincent Charity Hospital Medical Office Building, this \$36 million, 51,000-square-foot facility serves as a "no-wrong-door" entry point to provide immediate, compassionate care for adults facing urgent mental health or substance use crises.

By offering specialized, trauma-informed treatment, the campus provides a dignified alternative designed to divert thousands of individuals from overcrowded emergency rooms and jail cells annually.

It is our vision that the Glick Recovery Campus will be a beacon of hope for those who need immediate respite and stabilization, as well as ongoing support through The Centers' robust Behavioral Health Department.

Crisis Level of Care

Open 24/7, walk-in any time for mental health or substance use emergencies and is staffed by medical doctors, nurse practitioners, and peer support specialists. Our trauma-informed setting provides assessment, stabilization, and connection to ongoing care, with same-day support.

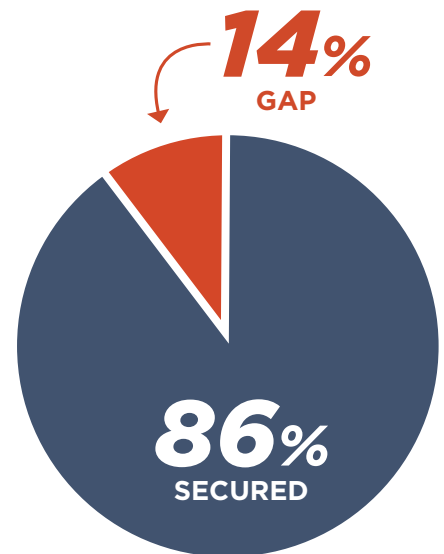

Lower overall community costs by reducing unnecessary emergency and inpatient care.



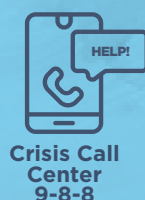
